[\*The Ruin\*](#), Director Markus Lenz, Germany, 2014, 73 minutes

*Synopsis*: 3000 people take over the building of a failed bank, a 200 meters skyscraper, to make it their home. The 750 families formed a socialist micro-society in a vertical town. The administration of the city ignores the project and people from the neighbourhood despise them, considering their place a slum which invaded the city centre. Against all odds, the inhabitants continue to adapt the space to their needs and even establish an internal regulations system.



## ***SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 20***

The workshop uses Sibiu's engagement with arts festivals, especially the Sibiu International Theatre Festival (Festivalul Internațional de Teatru Sibiu – FITS), to showcase the social value and the role played in economic regeneration and building a city image by performing arts festivals. FITS is world's third performing arts event in terms of magnitude and relevance. The workshop will show how Sibiu used the FITS and the European Capital of Culture designation as a strategy to reposition and differentiate itself and will explore the impact of the festival in terms of community development and the organization of urban space.

*Visit the other capital*, Andrei Gheorghiuță, meeting point in front of the building. Registration required. Registration available starting September 1st.

Transfer by bus to Alba Iulia and back is involved. For colleagues leaving in the afternoon there is the option of storing luggage in the bus and getting dropped off at the airport.

This workshop proposes a visit to Alba Iulia and its Vauban-style citadel, the largest in Romania and one of the largest in Europe. For many years, the Alba Carolina citadel was off limits for citizens due to its designation as a military objective. Following its transfer to the local authorities the citadel has become the site of one of the most spectacular urban regeneration projects in recent years. The workshop includes a meeting with the city manager and the chief architect of Alba Iulia.
